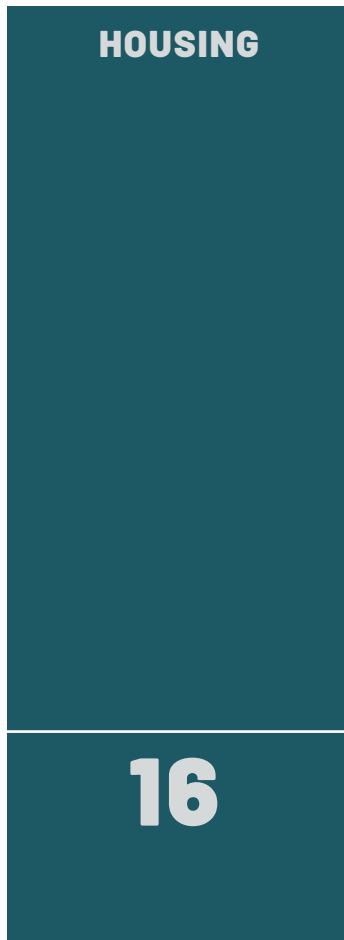

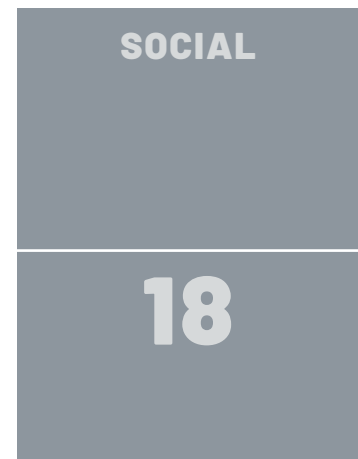

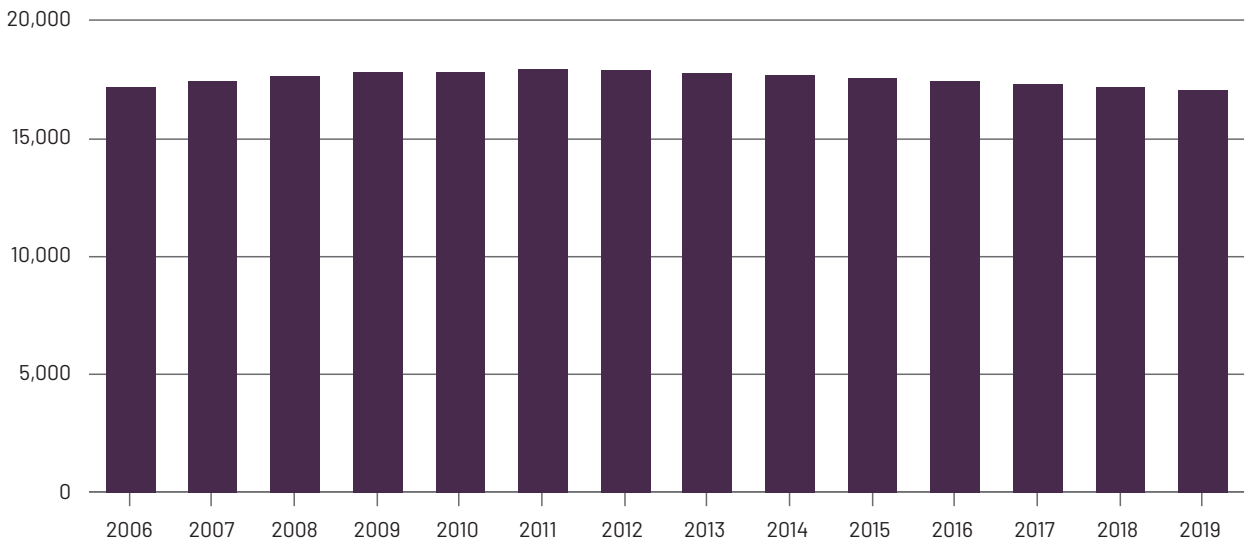

Estimated Resident Population 2019

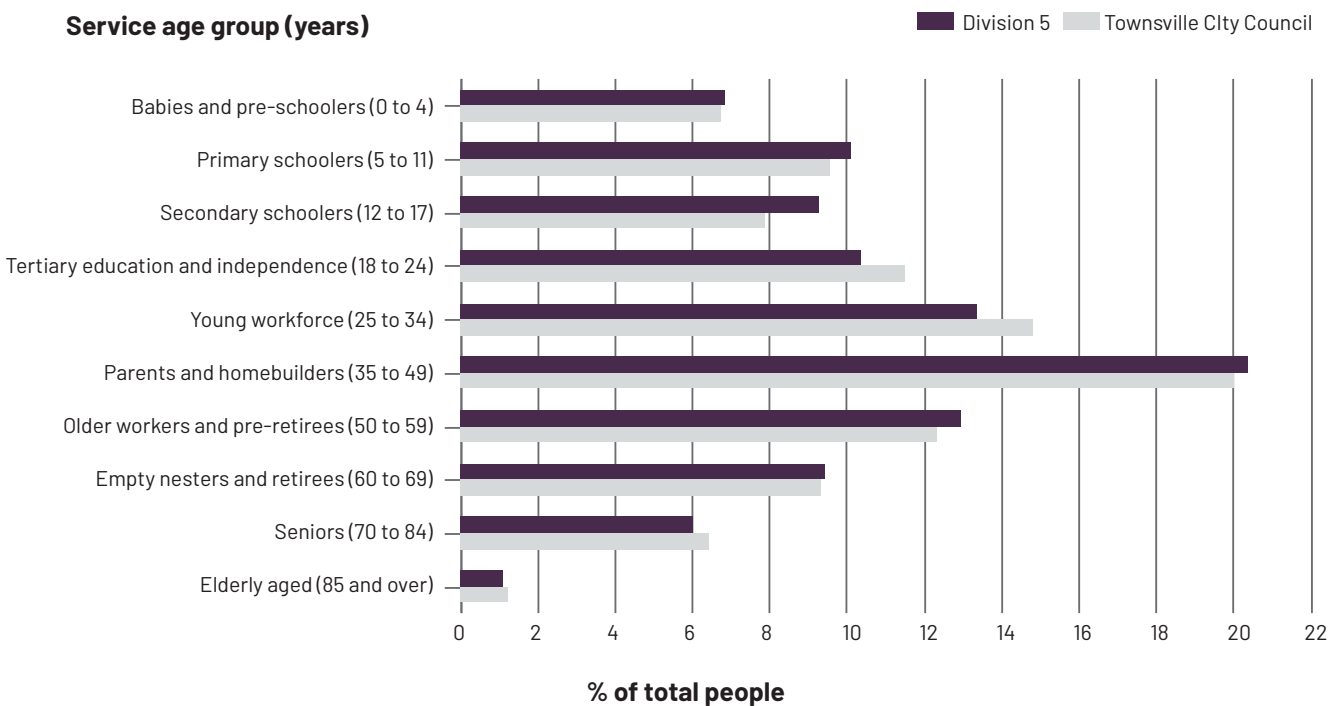

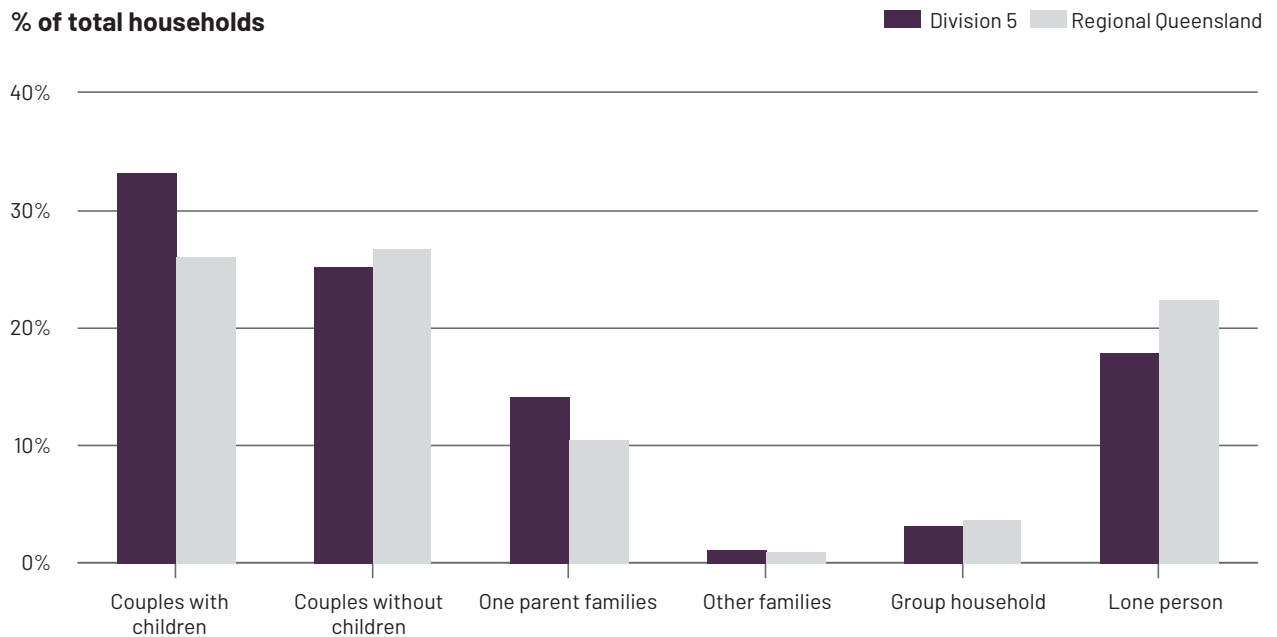
Resident Age Structure

Service age group (years)



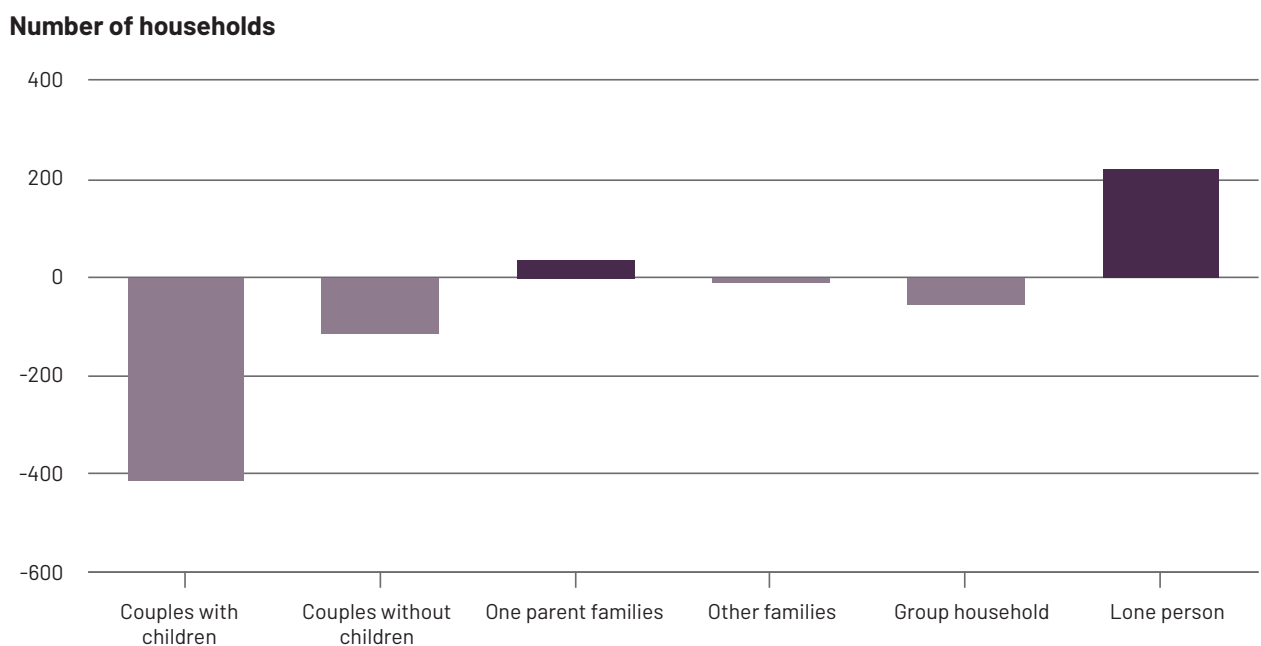

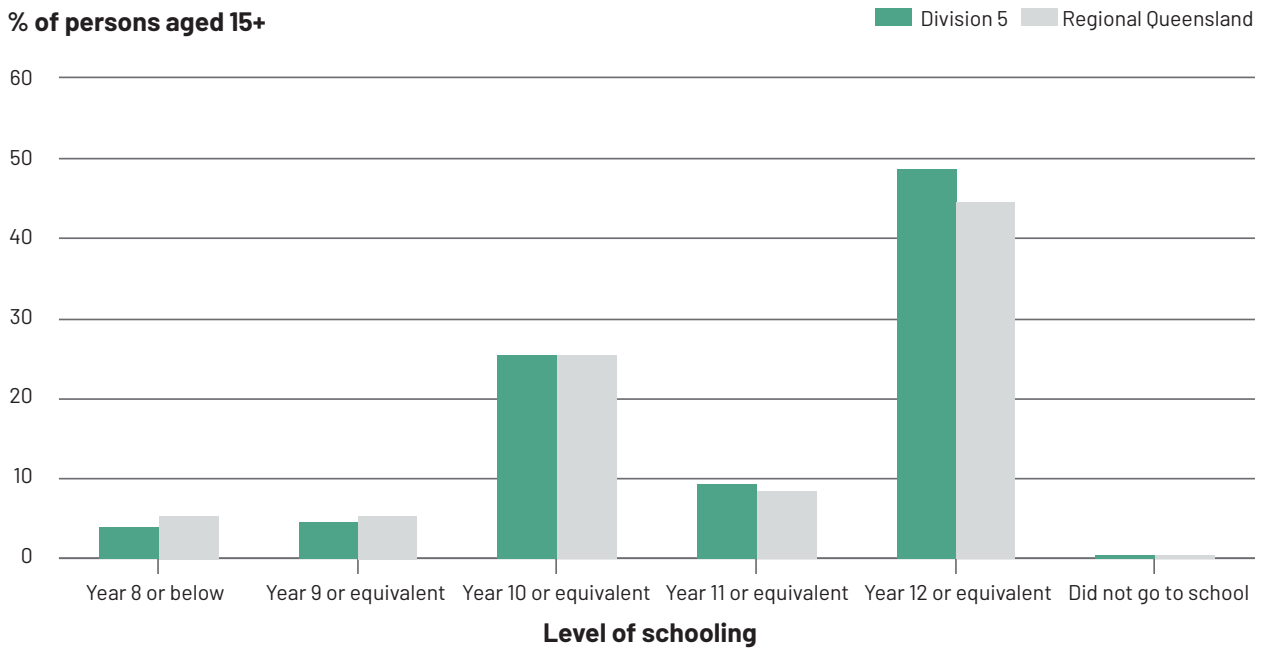
Change in household type, 2011 to 2016

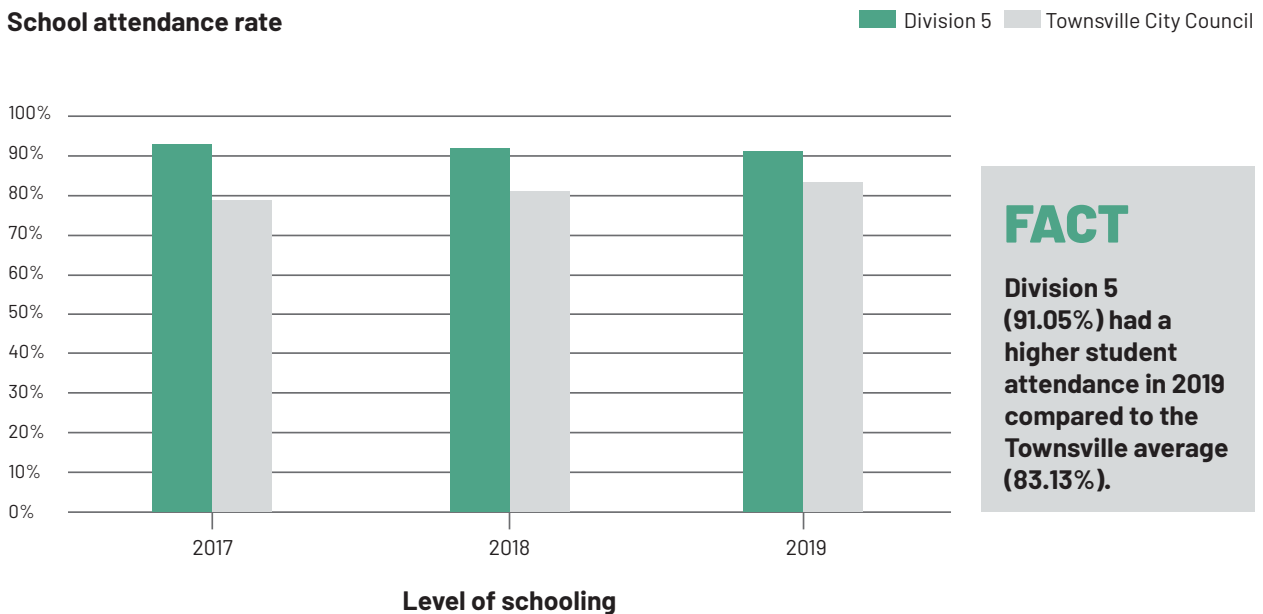

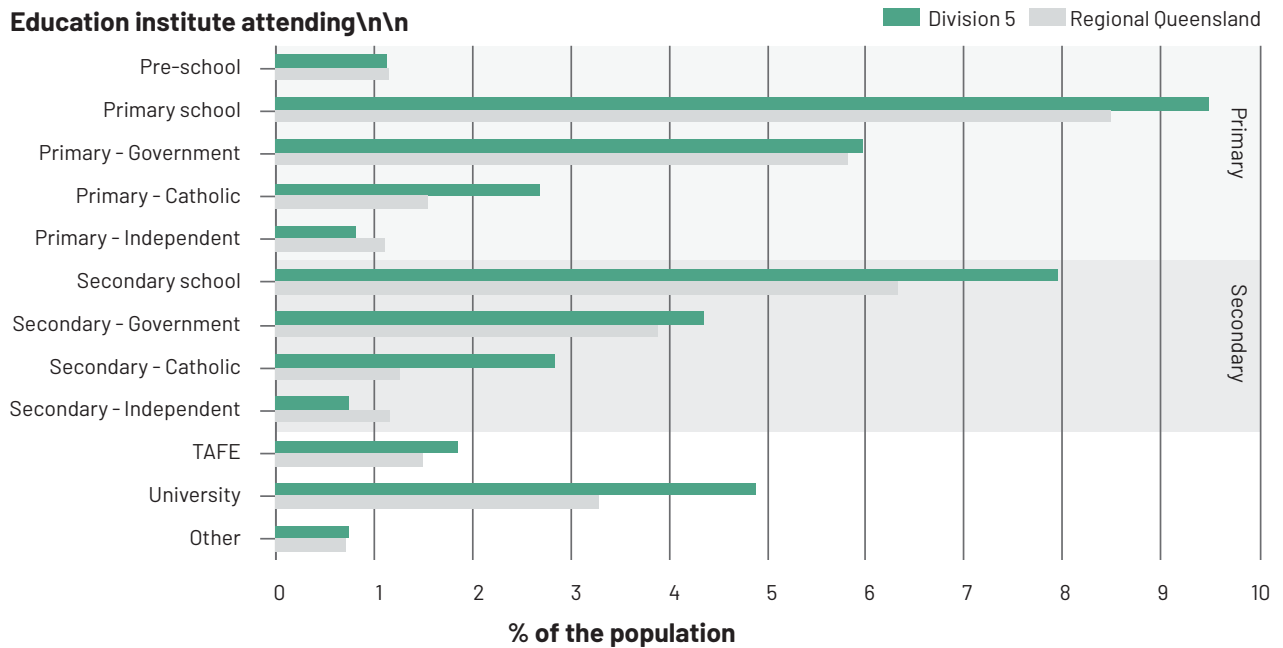
Student attendance rates at State Schools

Education Institution Attendance

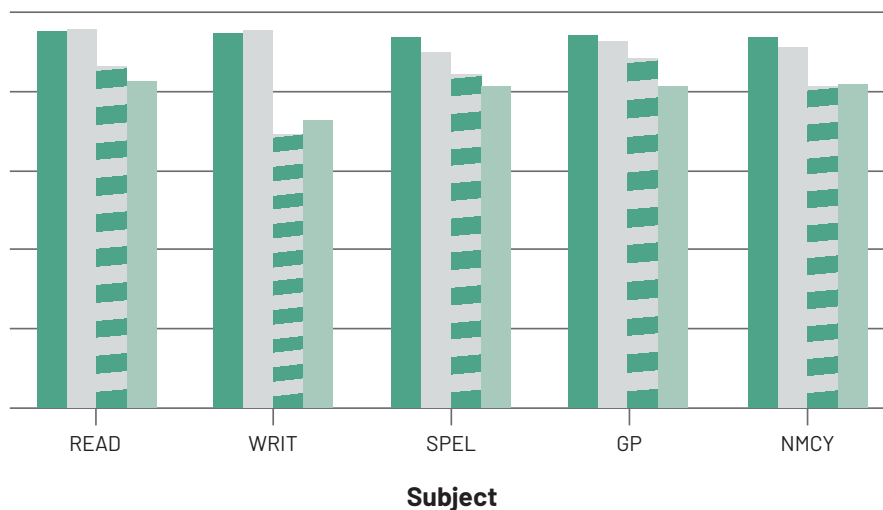

 Year 7: Division 5 (medium green), Townsville City Council (light green)



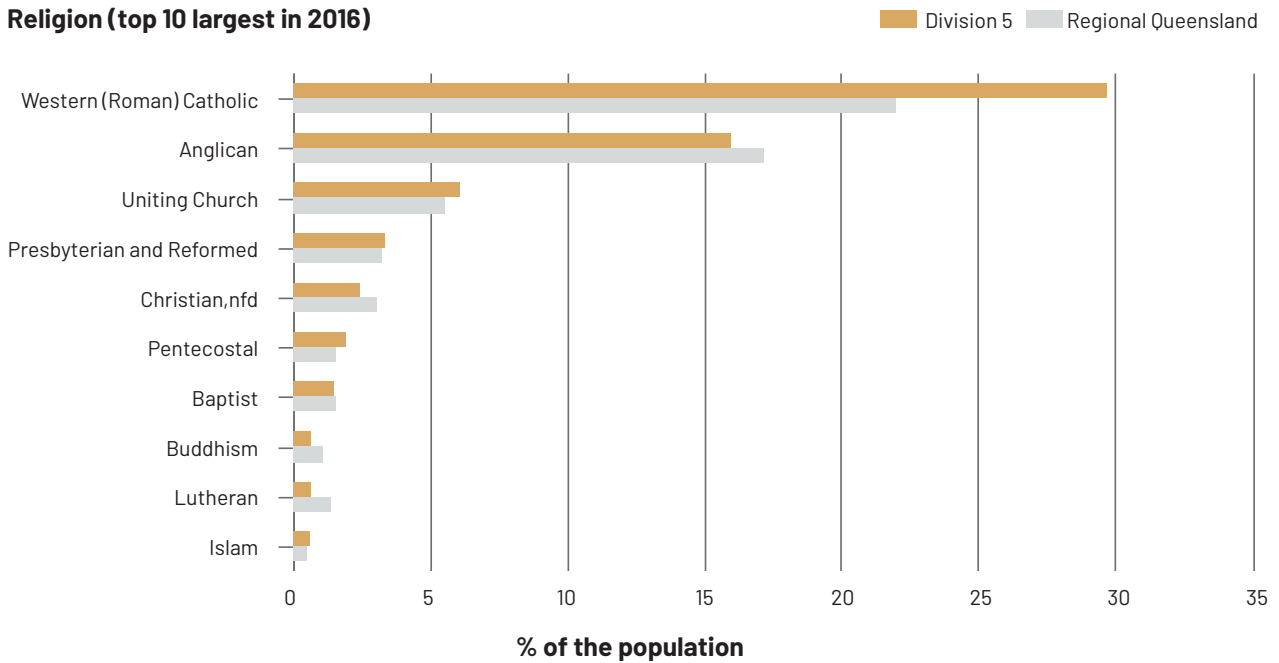

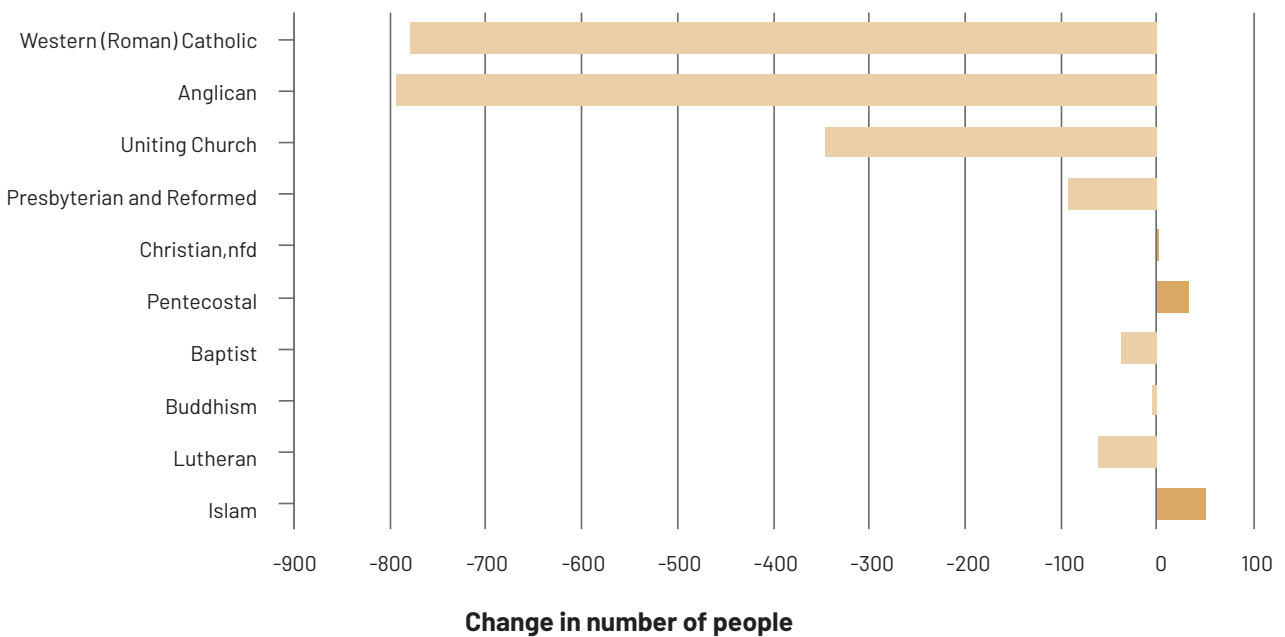
Religion (top 10 largest in 2016)

Change in religion, 2011 to 2016

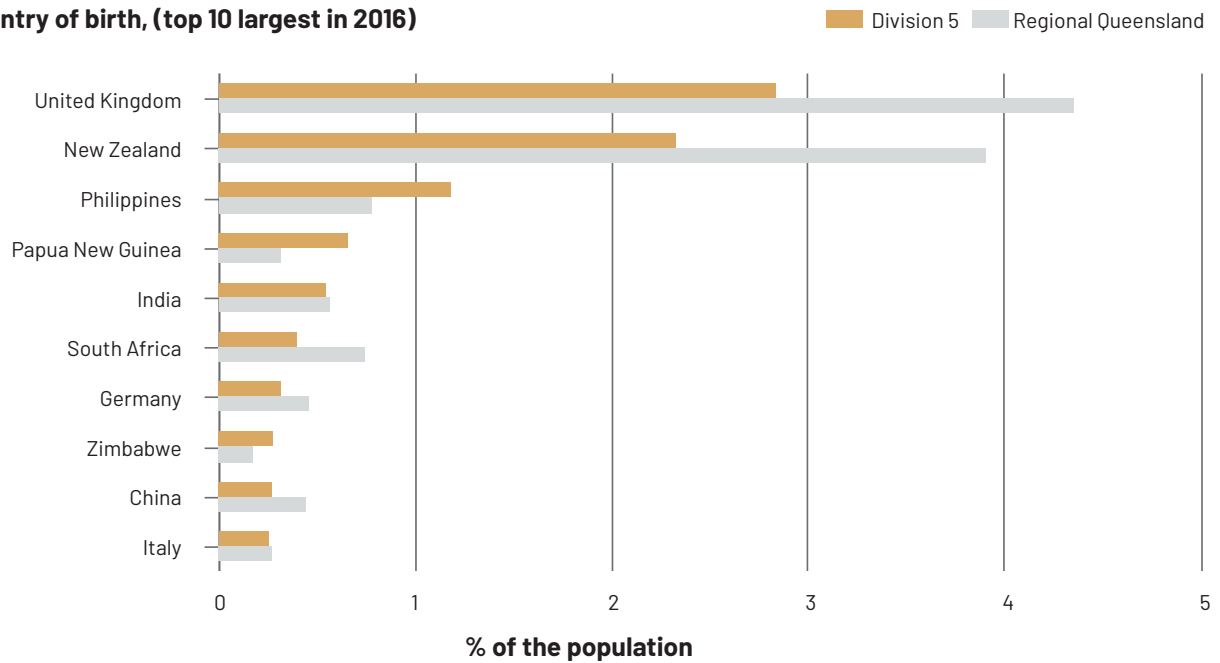
Religion (top 10 largest in 2016)

Birthplace of Residents

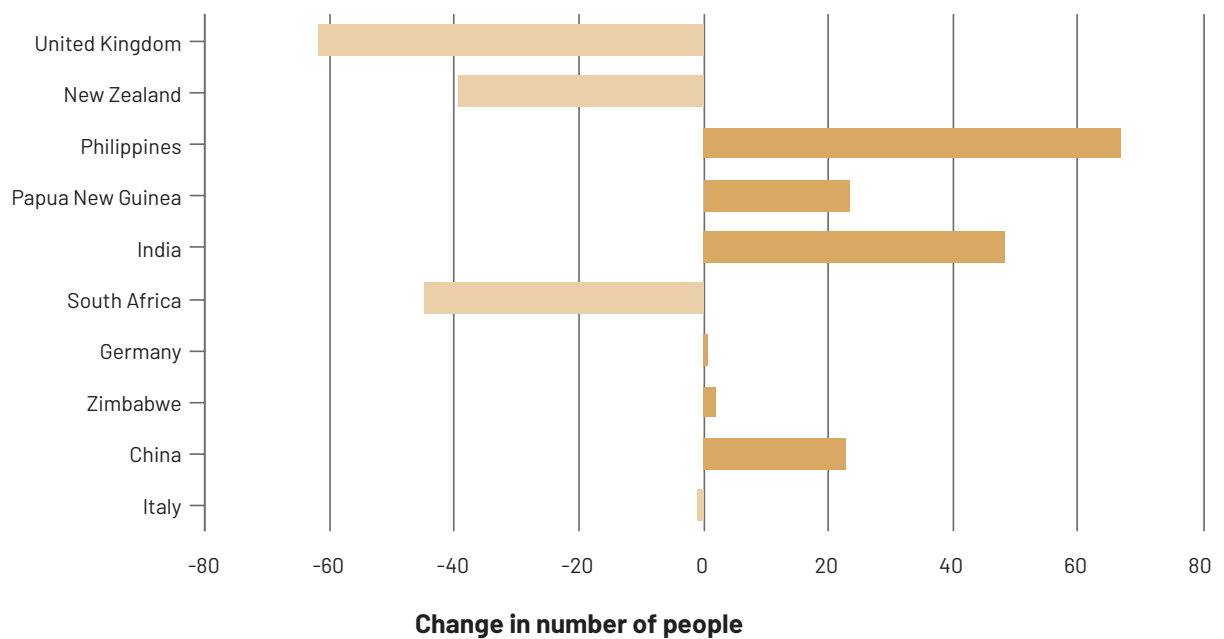
Country of birth, (top 10 largest in 2016)

Country of birth, (top 10 largest in 2016)

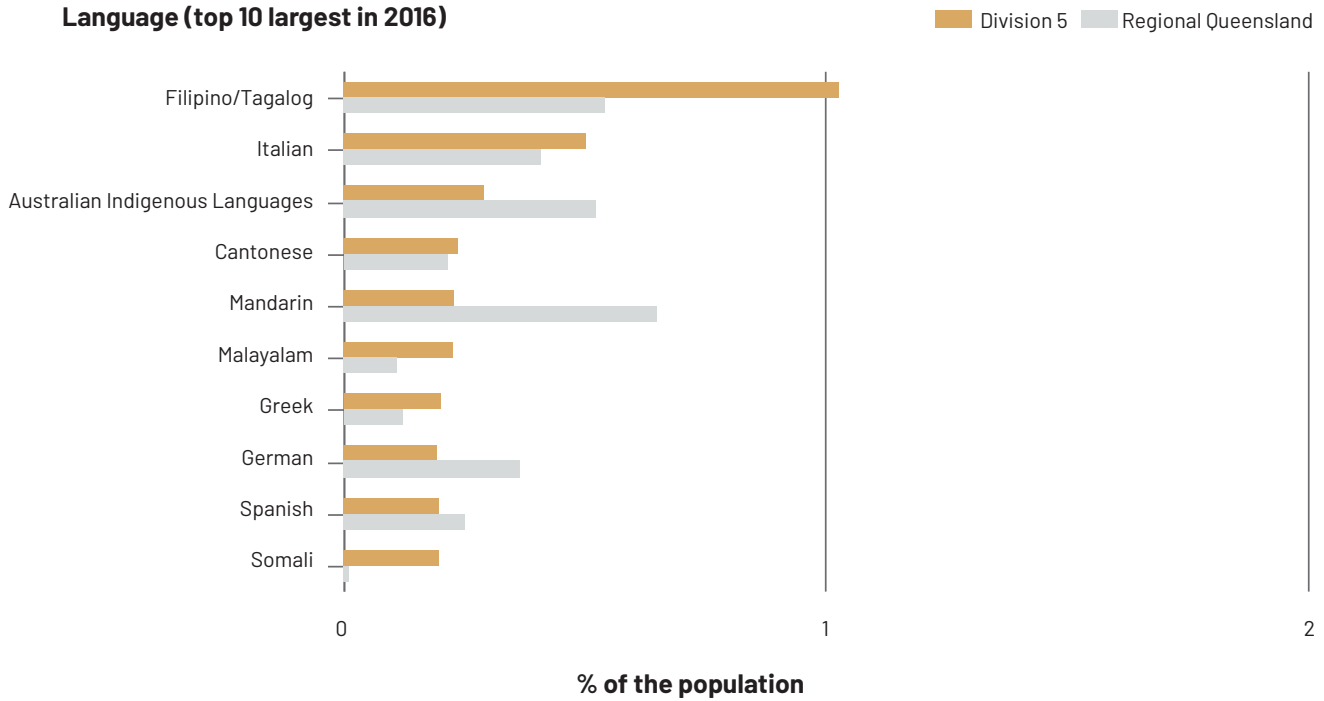

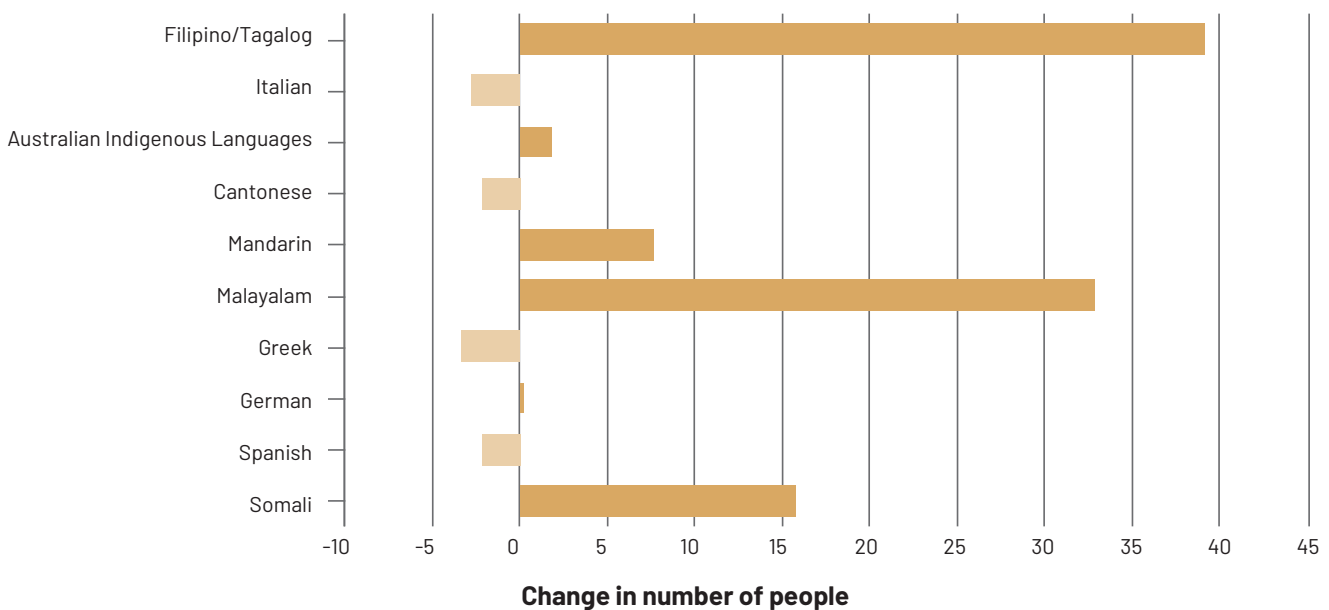
Language (top 10 largest in 2016)

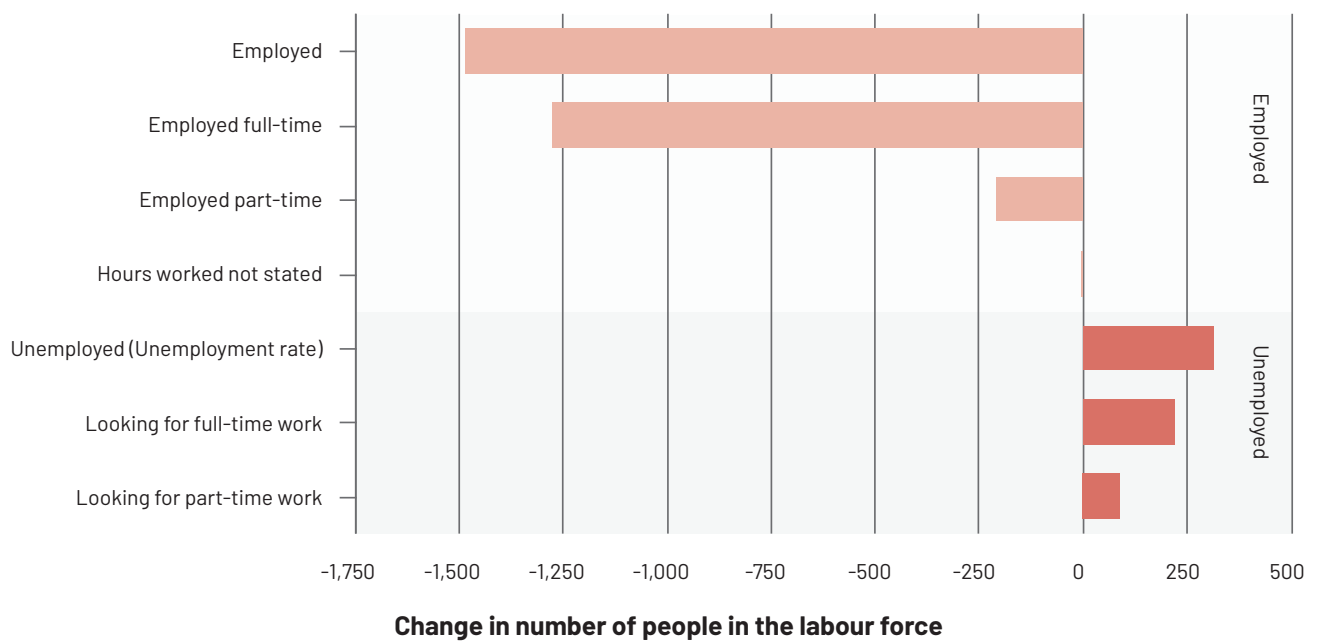

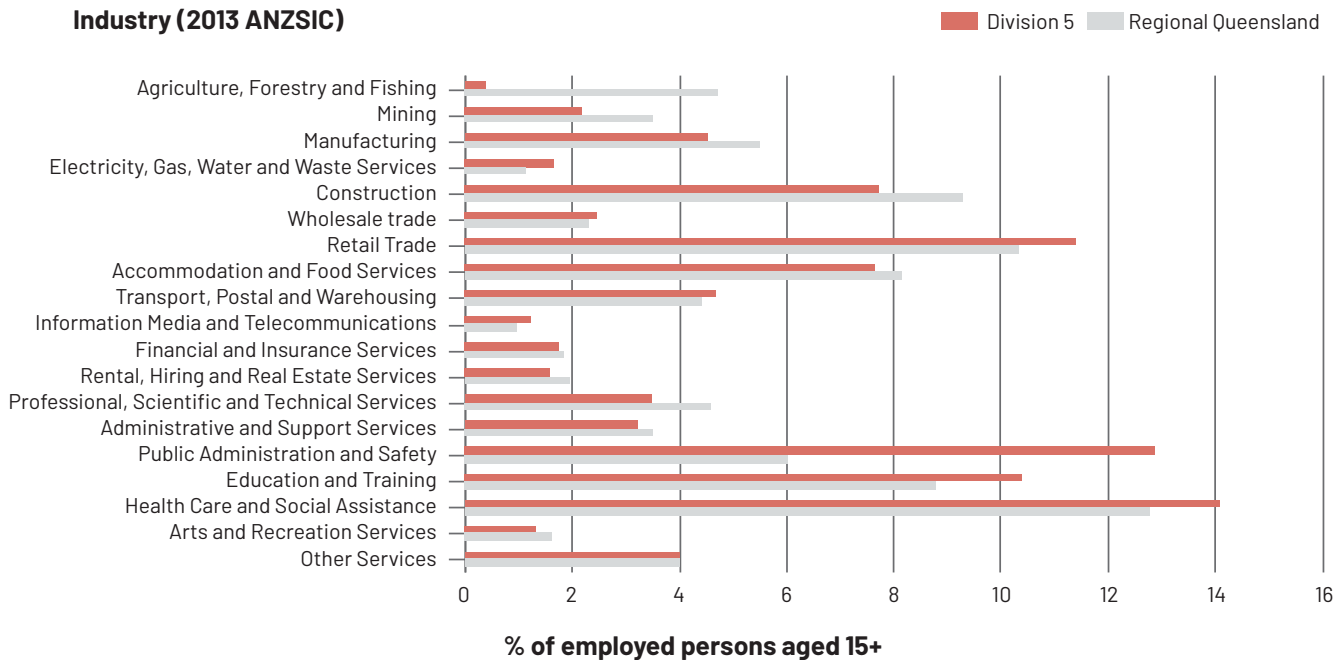

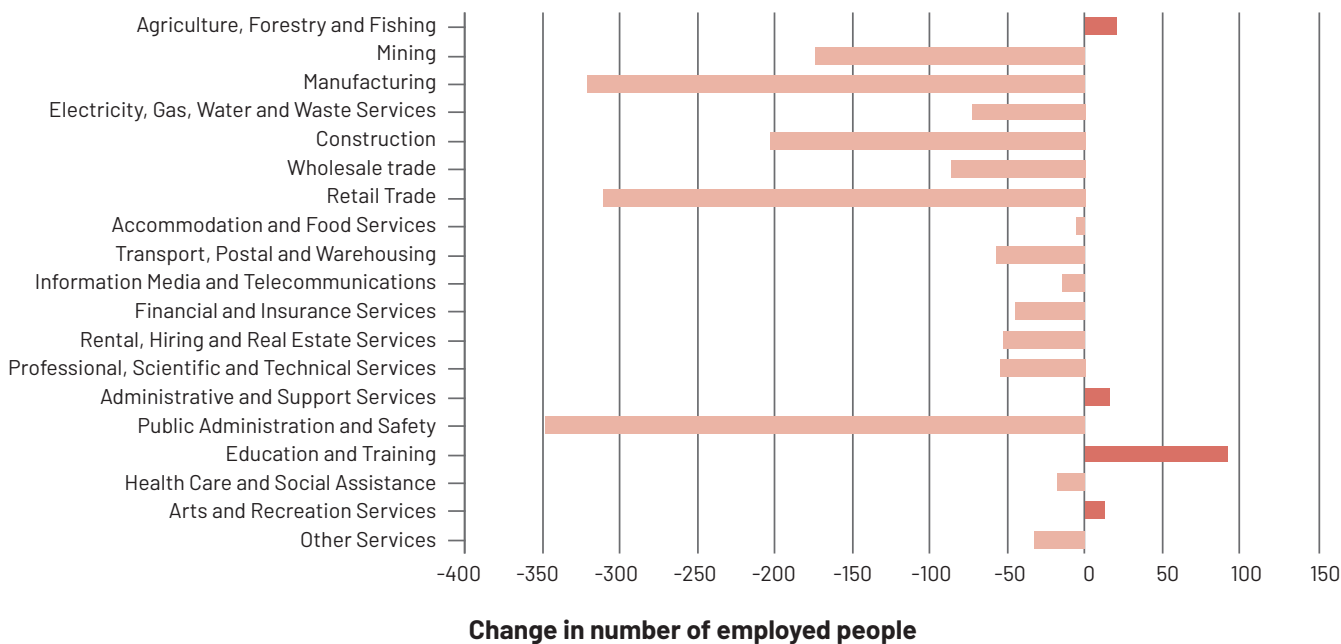
Industry (2013 ANZSIC)

Change in industries of employment, 2011 to 2016

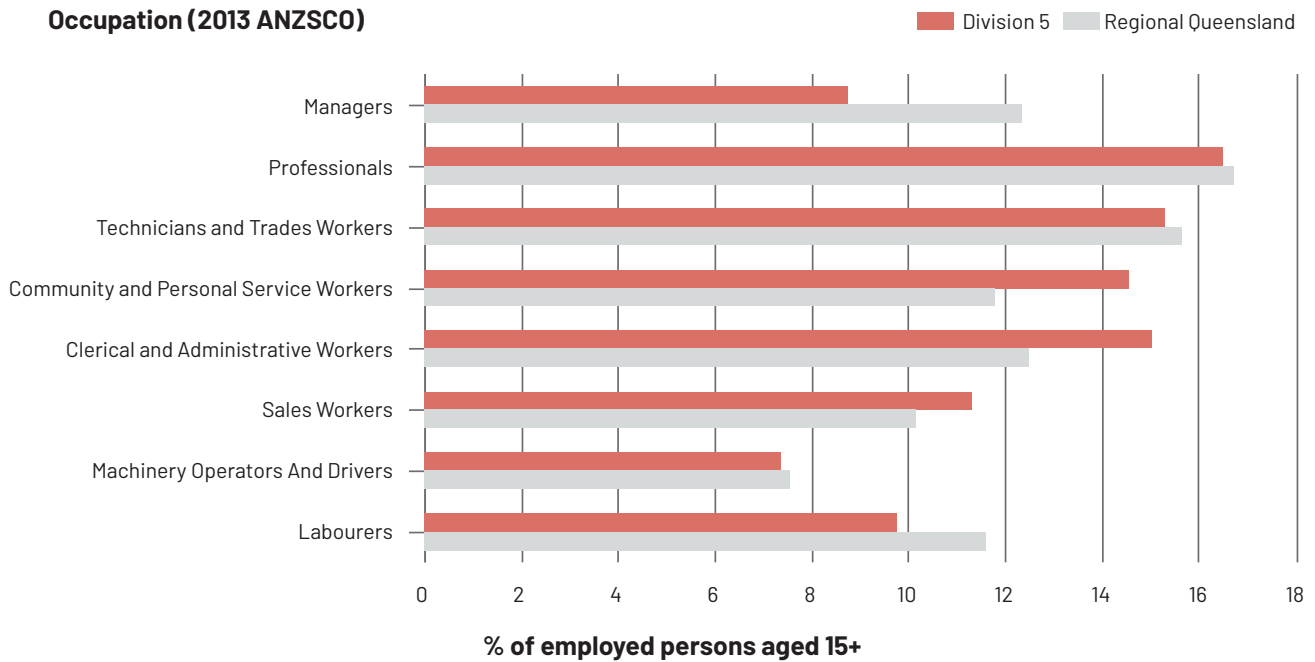

Occupations of Residents

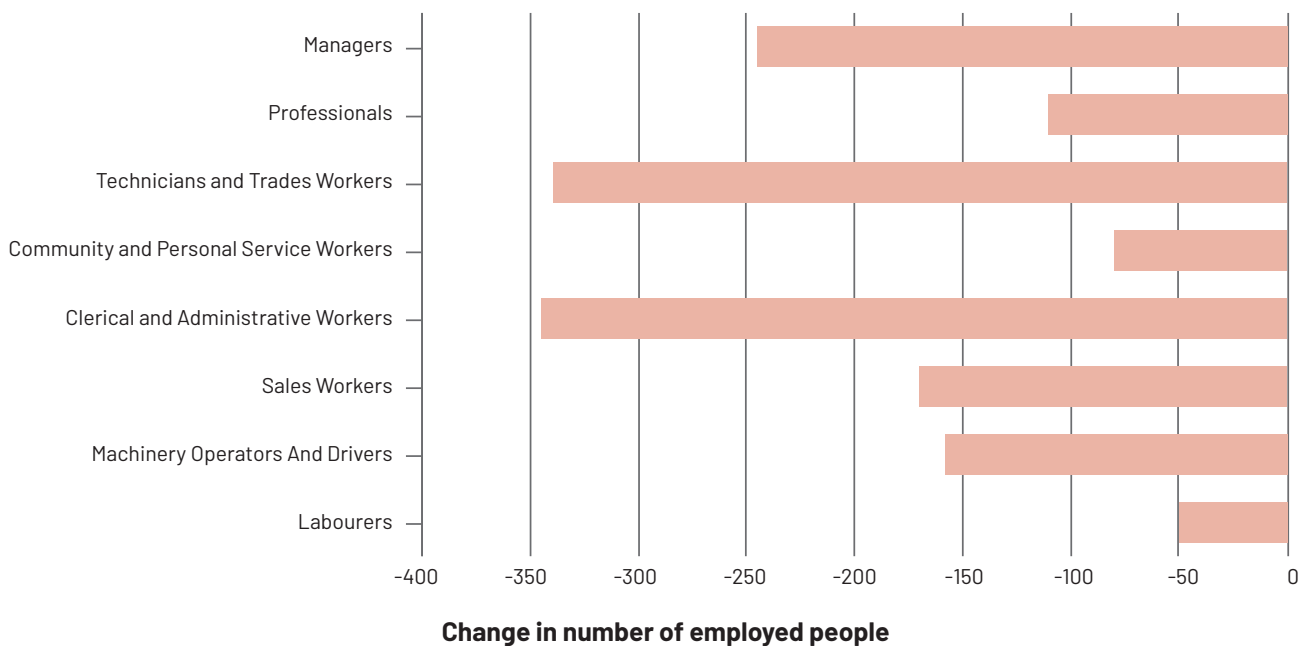
Occupation (2013 ANZSCO)

Change in occupations of residents, 2011 to 2016

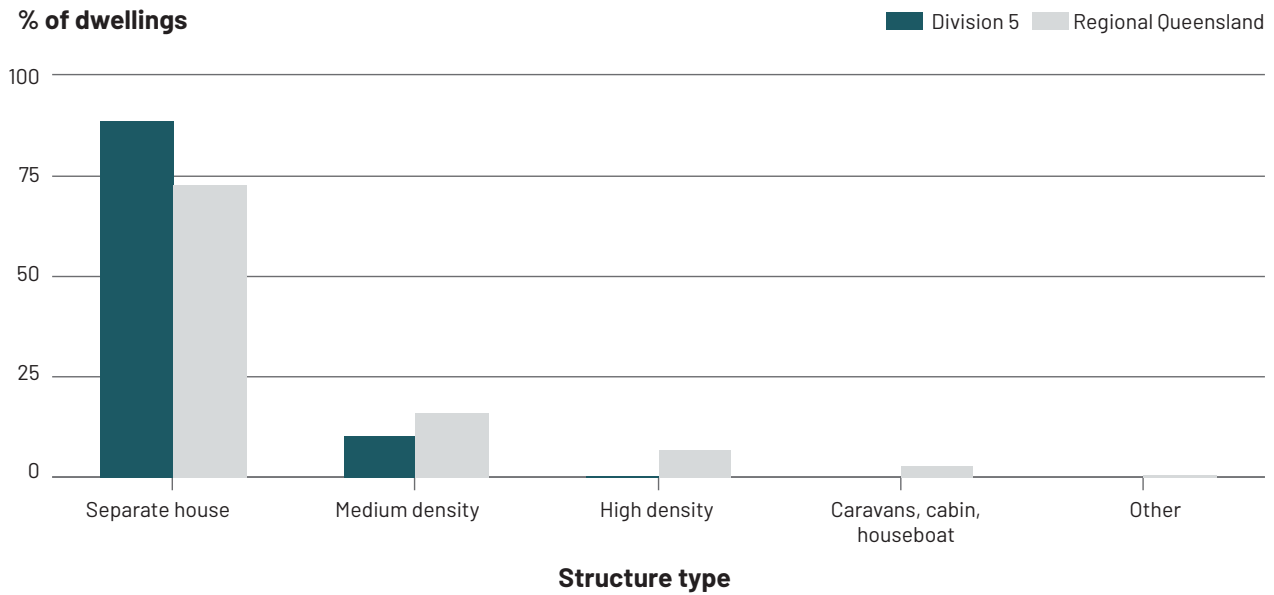

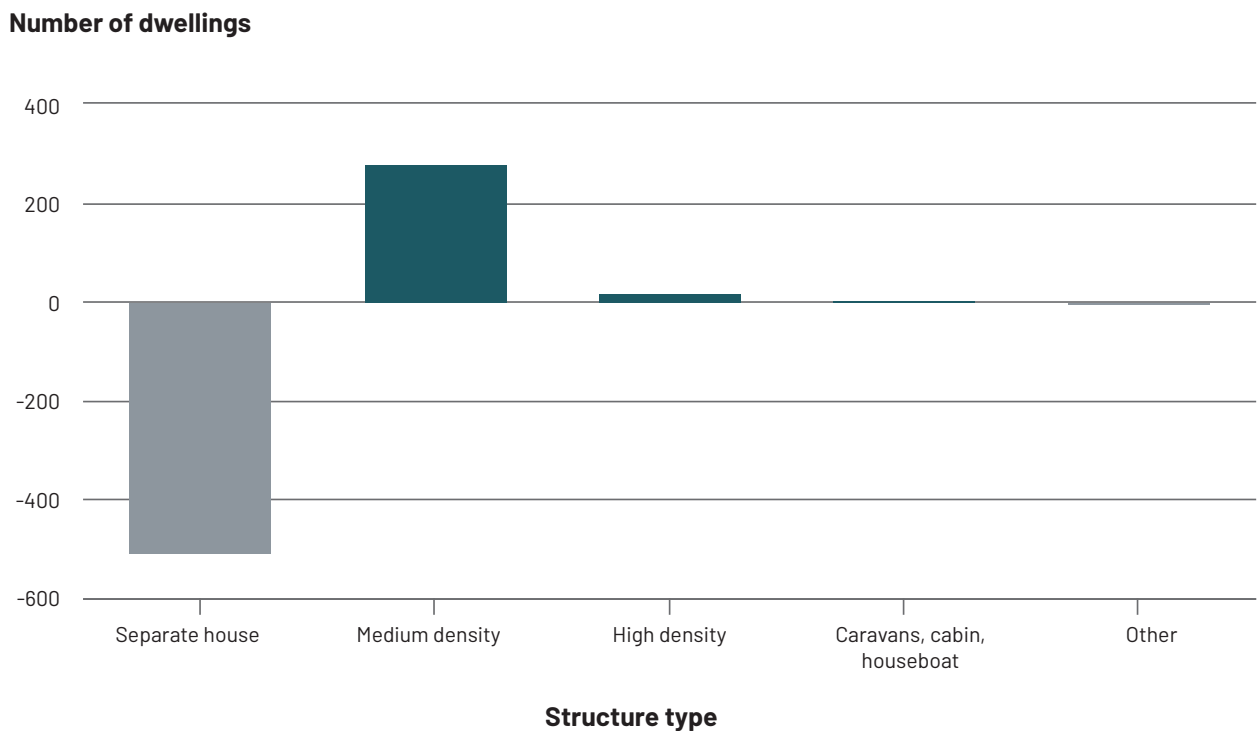

Dwelling Structure



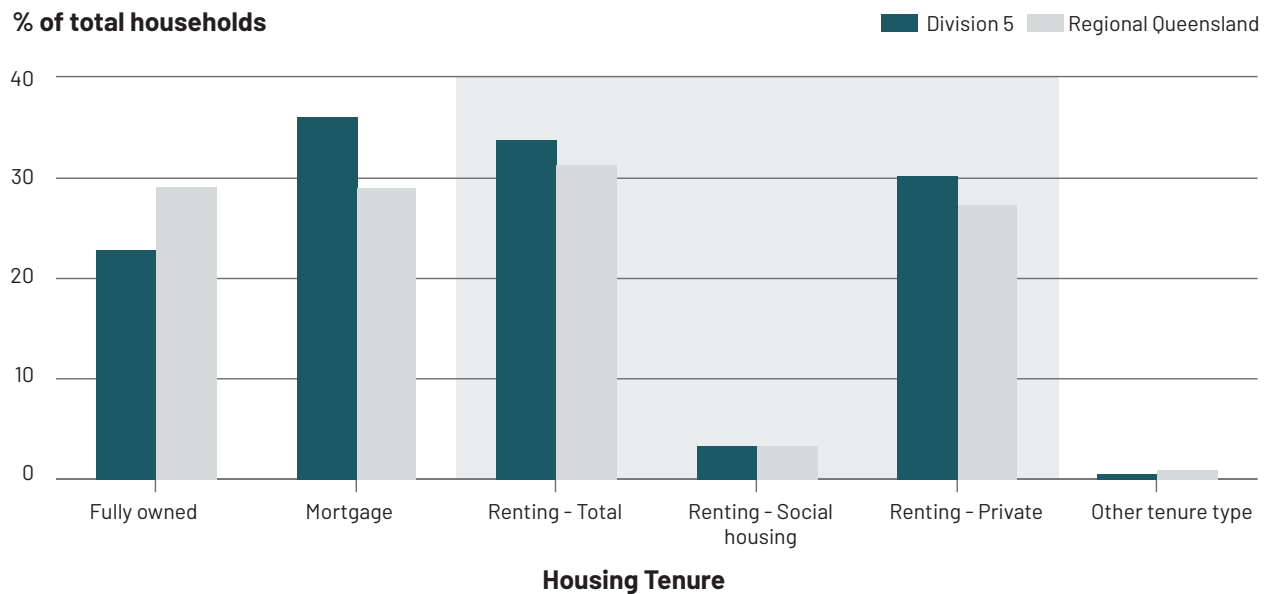

Change in Dwelling Structure



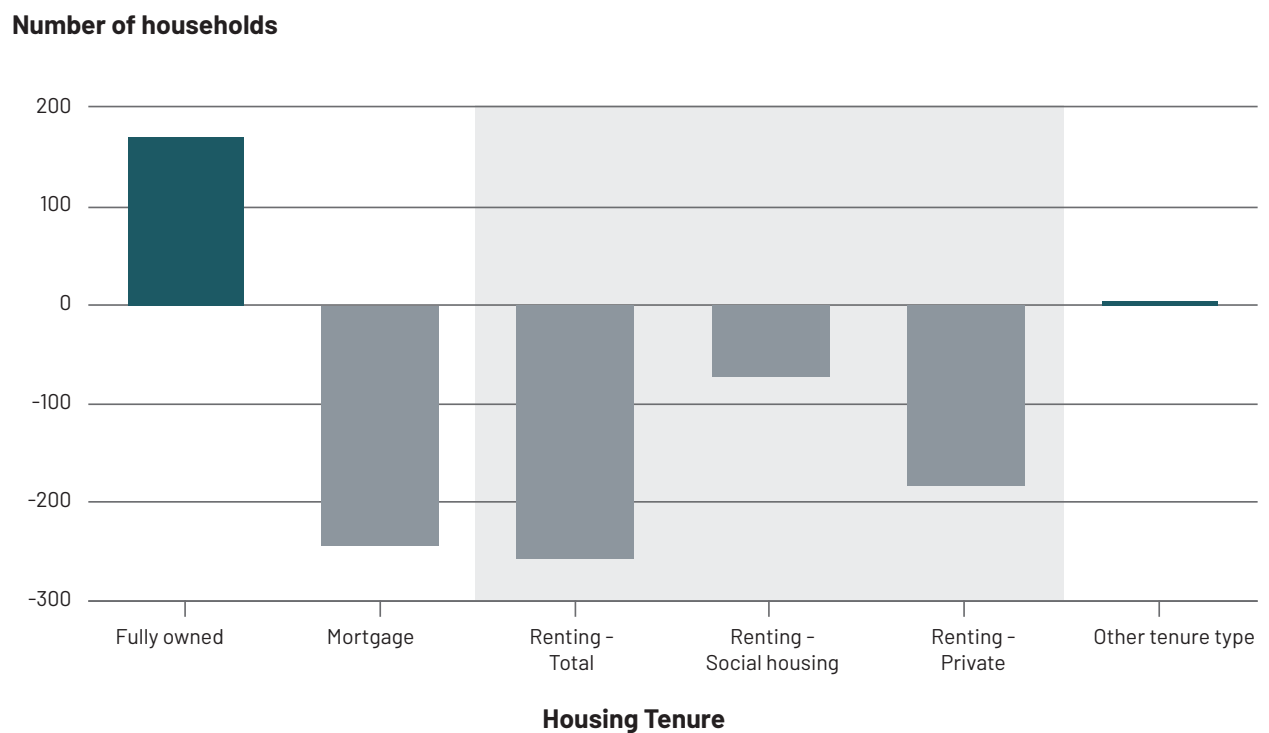

SOCIAL INFRASTRUCTURE & COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

SEIFA

SEIFA indexes are a good place to start to get a general view of the relative level of disadvantage in one area compared to others, but it is important to also look at these underlying characteristics as they can differ markedly between areas with similar SEIFA scores and shed light on the type of disadvantage being experienced.

A higher score on the index means a lower level of disadvantage. A lower score on the index means a higher level of disadvantage or, in the case of IRSAD, a higher level of advantage.

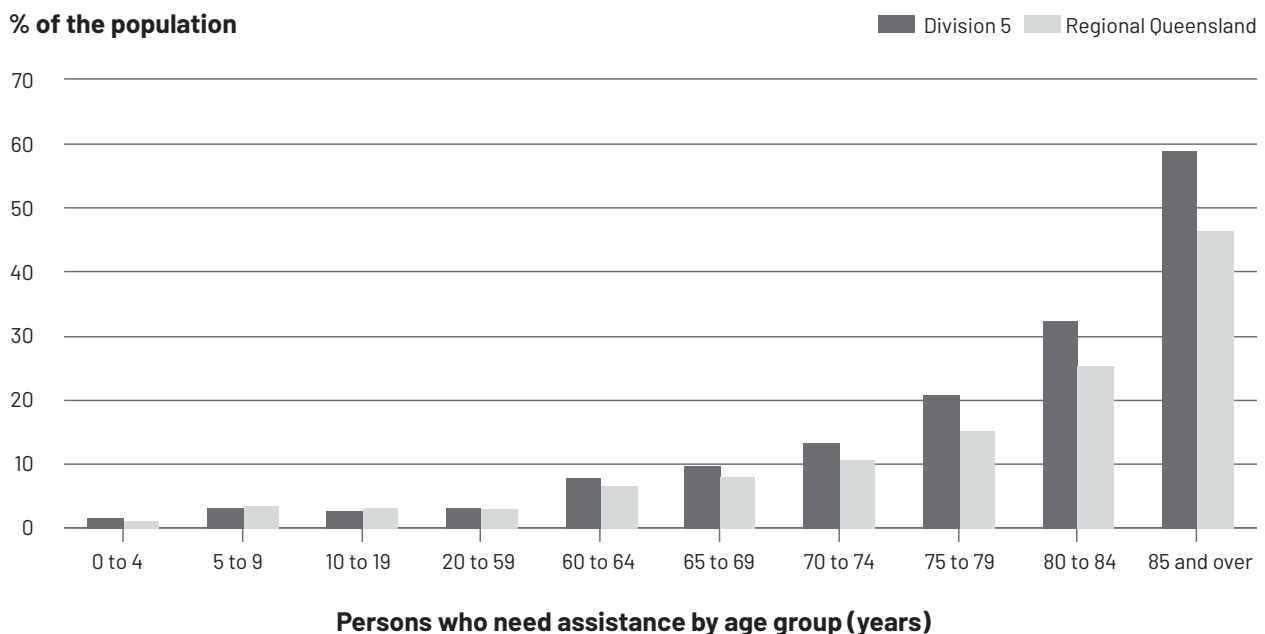

% of the population

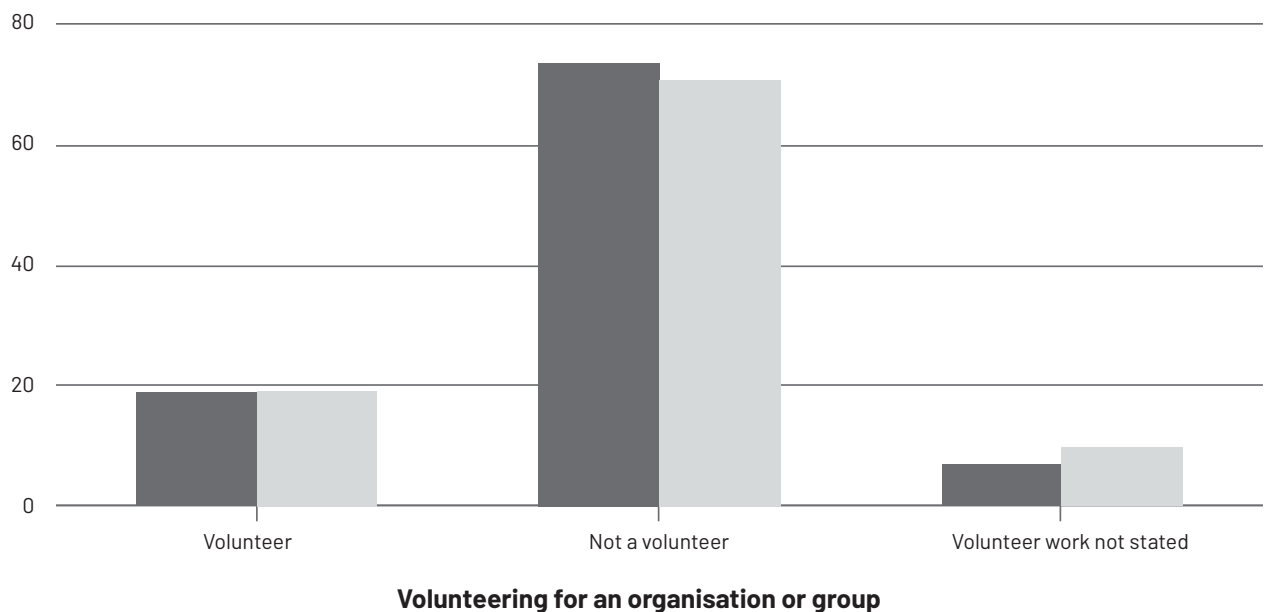
